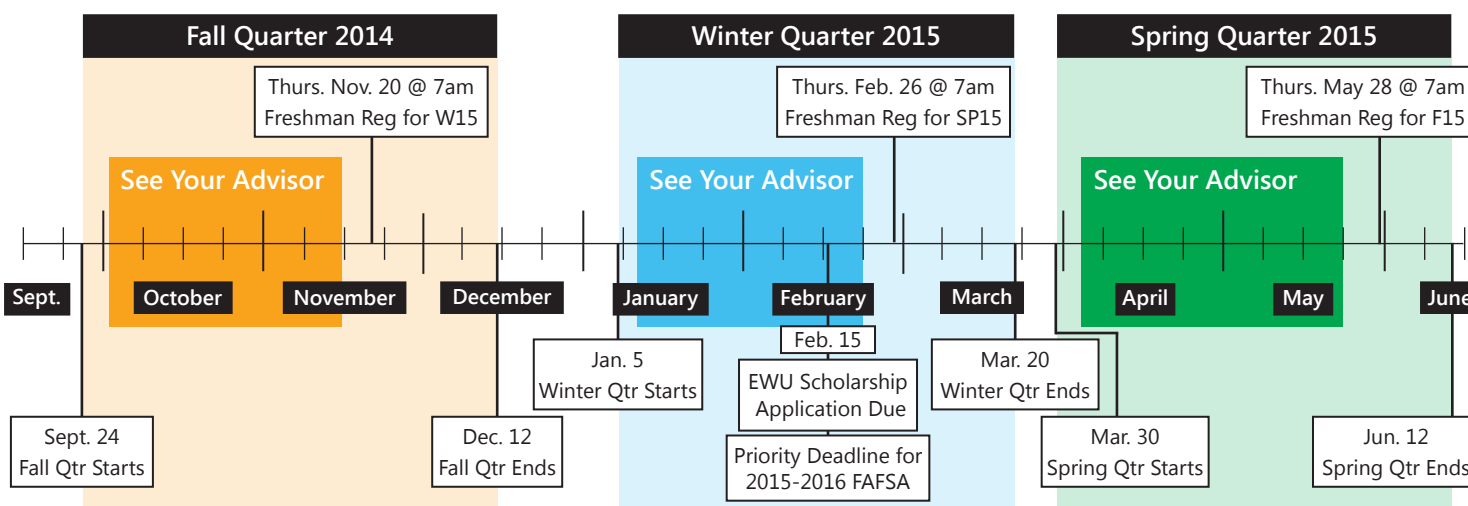

Requirements for the baccalaureate degree at EWU include all of the following:

Credit requirement minimums

- 180 cumulative credit hours (credits in *MTHD 100, 103, 104 & MATH 199; CPLA 100; ENGL 100* do not count toward the 180 cumulative credits)
- 60 upper-division credits (300 and 400 level coursework)
- 45 credits in residence (attendance) at EWU, with at least 15 upper-division credits in the major in residence at EWU

2.0 cumulative GPA minimum

- for all EWU coursework
- for all General Education Core Requirements and University Graduation Requirements
- in major programs, subject to departmental requirements
- in minor programs, subject to departmental requirements

If a student chooses to take two courses from the same subject area, a third course from a different subject area must be chosen for a total of three science courses.
