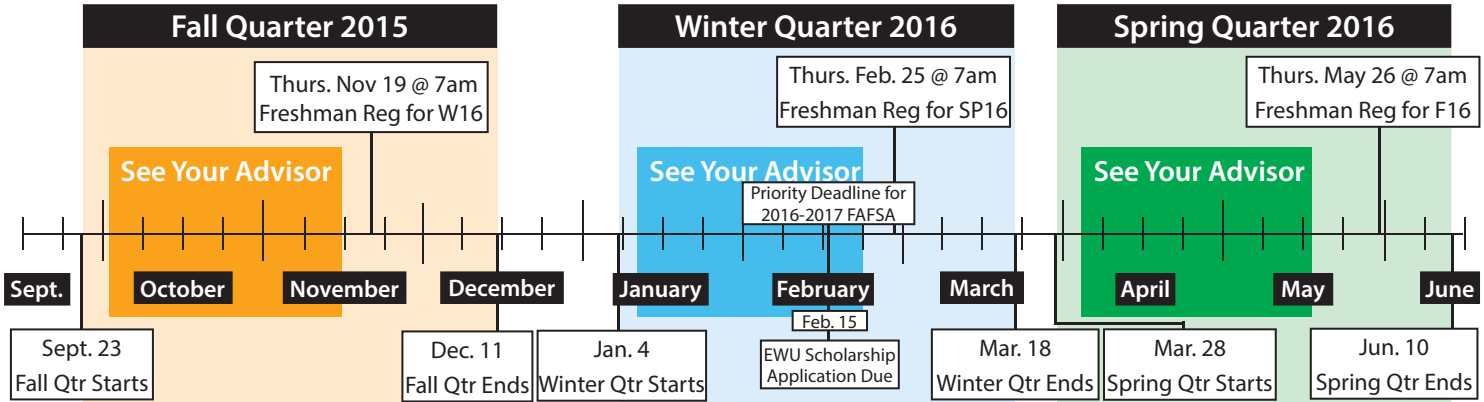

- 60 upper-division credits (300 and 400 level coursework)
- 45 credits in residence (attendance) at EWU, with at least 15 upper-division credits in the major in residence at EWU
