- 45 credits in residence (attendance) at EWU, with at least 15 upper-division credits in the major in residence at EWU

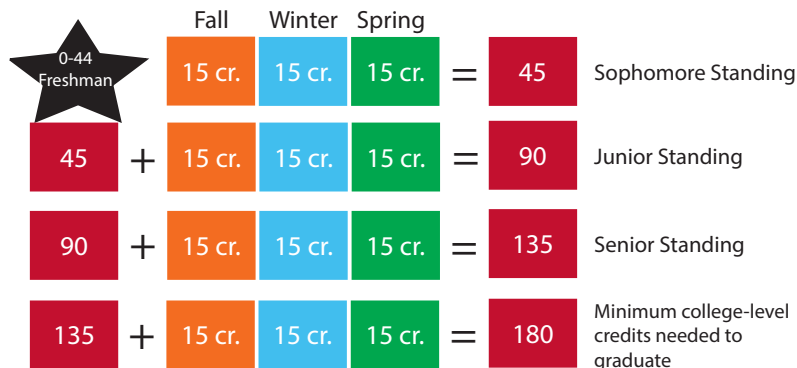

Class Standing by Credits

Quarterly priority registration is based on completed credits earned - see <https://inside.ewu.edu/records-and-registration/calendar-2> for registration dates for Winter 2020 through Fall 2020.

Your class standing, based on earned college level credits (does not include any classes you are currently registered for), requires that freshmen (<45 credits) meet quarterly with advisor. Juniors (>90 credits) need to meet with advisor to declare major.

Senior Capstone

A pre-requisite means you must have completed the identified course/s (or requirement) prior to being able to register for that course. A red asterisk "*" indicates a pre-requisite. There may be more than one way to satisfy a pre-requisite; discuss options with your advisor. Concurrent or co-requisite means you can take the "pre-req" course at the same time.

Cross-Listed Courses

Courses showing in green indicate cross-listed courses. You can register for either course number and it will be the same class; e.g., MUSC 212 and HUMN 212 are the same course.
