Foreign Language

Two years of a single foreign language in high school or one year of a single language in college is required for all Bachelor of Arts (BA) degrees. American Sign Language satisfies this requirement. This excludes BS, BAB, BAE, BFA, and BM degrees. Check with your advisor for other possible degree exclusions.

Senior Capstone

ITGS 400 (4) Interdisciplinary Senior Capstone or students may fulfill this requirement by completing a department capstone/thesis course. Check with the major department for requirements.

Class Standing by Credits

Quarterly priority registration is based on completed credits earned - see page 1 for registration dates for Winter 2019 through Fall 2019.

Your class standing, based on earned college level credits (does not include any classes you are currently registered for), requires that Freshmen (<45 credits) meet quarterly with advisor. Juniors (>90 credits) need to declare major and meet with advisor.
