

HARDWORKING SINGLE DAD RECEIVES EWURA SCHOLARSHIP



Kevin Uyekawa, 41, will enter his senior year at Eastern this coming fall.

The single father of a 5-year-old son is majoring in mechanical engineering while holding down a paid internship and logging a lot of miles in his car.

Uyekawa can continue his education and pursue his goals – with a little more breathing room – thanks to an EWURA scholarship that is providing \$3,105 to help with expenses for the upcoming 2023-24 academic year.

"The scholarship definitely helps me to not be so stressed out financially," he says, adding that it will allow him to better prioritize school, spend more time studying and tackle added childcare expenses as his son, Kaleb, starts kindergarten.

Graduating with minimal debt will also help Uyekawa realize a goal of moving from their apartment into a home with a yard so that Kaleb can have more space as he grows up and the family can get a dog.

To make ends meet, and gain vital work experience, Uyekawa works at Keytronics, in Spokane Valley. As an intern in the Automation and Design Department, he designs test fixtures for final-stage products as well as automation fixtures to facilitate different processes in an assembly line.

"It's the exact type of engineering I want to do," he says. "I got really lucky."

Uyekawa works 25 hours a week but that doesn't account for the time spent driving back and forth from his home in Spokane to classes, to his son's daycare in Cheney, and to his job in Spokane Valley.

Uyekawa juggles a lot but says it's worth it to be a role model for Kaleb. When his son is older, he looks forward to guiding him through the college process. Originally from Temecula, California, Uyekawa was working as a tire technician at The Tire Store in Spokane when Kaleb was born and recalls thinking, "I want to be able to support my kid and be able to get out of an apartment and into a house, what am I going to do?"

EWU was the answer. Uyekawa, who is determined to make the most of his education and set himself up for a successful career, is an example of a hardworking student seeking to balance the demands of school, work and life.

Although he experiences stress from his multiple responsibilities, Uyekawa is able to stay positive because of opportunities at Eastern - like the EWURA scholarship.

Eyekawa is grateful to the retirees: "I just want to say thank you. It really helps boost my confidence in that I'm doing the right thing and that's a huge thing, getting support from people who believe in me."

EWU Cyber Defenders won the NCAEW Cyber Games in Tampa, Florida on April 22 and made the Spokane news.

STUDENT PURSUES HER CAREER DREAM THANKS TO EWURA

Browning, a junior, now plans to earn a doctorate degree and become a philosophy professor. The retirees' association recently awarded her a \$3,105 Golden Eagle Scholarship to help cover costs for the upcoming 2023-24 academic year.

The Spokane resident started college at Eastern with a plan to become an English as a second language teacher.

However, her plans quickly changed when a general education class that fit her schedule sparked another interest: philosophy.

"I took a philosophy class in my first quarter – and it was all over," Browning recalls. "I realized that philosophy was what I wanted to do all along."

With the world being so vast and filled with so many ideas and traditions, Browning recognizes that the knowledge of existence and purpose is limitless. "The world is an incredibly huge and diverse place," says Browning.

Browning was grateful to hear she was awarded the scholarship because "finances were one of the reasons I didn't go to college right away," she says.

Browning, who takes full-time classes and works part-time as an academic coach and office aid for the PLUS tutoring center, was thrilled when she got a call from EWURA's Ron Dalla, telling her she'd been selected for the scholarship award.

"That was really exciting and just the idea that they chose me and that all the work I put into my education is paying off," she says.

Browning loved meeting all the EWU retirees at the annual president's breakfast.

"They've had careers in higher education and academia and since that's the pathway I want to pursue, it was really great to see them all and get to chat with them and just be a part of that breakfast," says Browning.

She would like to thank everyone involved with the EWURA. She said, "It was so unexpected and exciting and so valuable in moving forward in my academic career, to be recognized like this."
